

SUMMARY: An Ordinance amending Ordinance 93 to allow the Board of County Commissioners to waive certain prohibitions against granting licenses and employment certificates.

ORDINANCE NO. 93

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND COUNTY ORDINANCE 93 ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE REGISTRATION WITH THE WASHOE COUNTY SHERIFF AND FINGER-PRINTING AND THUMBPRINTING OF EMPLOYEES INCLUDING LICENSEES OF GAMBLING HOUSES AND EMPLOYEES INCLUDING LICENSEES OF ESTABLISHMENTS WHERE ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE SOLD AT RETAIL FOR CONSUMPTION ON THE PREMISES; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND REVOCATION OF EMPLOYMENT CERTIFICATES; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH."

THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF WASHOE COUNTY DO ORDAIN:

Section 1. County Ordinance 93, Section 2, Subsection (a) is hereby amended by adding thereto a paragraph to be numbered 8 to read as follows:

"8. In the event that the applicant for any license referred to in this Ordinance or for an employment certificate has been convicted of any crime as described above which would prohibit the issuance of a license or employment certificate and such conviction occurred more than five (5) years before the date of such application, the Board of County Commissioners may waive such prohibition and grant by a unanimous vote such license or employment certificate provided that the Sheriff and District Attorney both recommend such waiver."

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as prescribed by NRS 244.100.
